HEALDSBURG HIGHIGHIS

Something to meow about!

As of this writing, 169 at-risk animals, including 66 cats and 75 kittens, have been transferred directly to Healdsburg from crowded regional shelters this year! Direct transfer increases the total number of lives we can save and means the animals bypass a potentially stressful stop at our Santa Rosa campus.

HSSC's Healdsburg Shelter has been transferring adoptable animals directly from HSSC rescue partners since 2019. Our Healdsburg staff are able to provide intake exams, treat basic medical conditions, test for FeLV/FIV, and treat ringworm positive animals. They also have in-house lab equipment enabling them to do microscopic cytology for ear and skin infections and run full blood panels to diagnose certain health concerns.

The Healdsburg team works hard every step of the way on each animal's journey to adoption. They take care of everything from organizing transfers to cleaning habitats, administering medications, evaluating behavior, thoughtfully facilitating adoptions (281 to date!) and so much more!



Nonprofit of the Year!

We're not the only one singing the praises of our hardworking Healdsburg team! The Healdsburg Shelter was recently honored with the Nonprofit of the Year Award from the Healdsburg Chamber of Commerce. We are very proud of our tiny-but-mighty Healdsburg team for providing so much compassionate care to the animals and our community.



Remembering Dean Gross - a forever friend to the animals

HSSC is saddened by the loss of our dear friend Dean Gross. A compassionate and caring advocate for the animals of the Healdsburg Shelter, Dean was especially fond of cats. Along with his partner Clay Nesbitt, he was a longtime volunteer and supporter of HSSC. Each week he spent time doting on our shelter cats, giving them love and companionship. Our hearts go out to Clay and his family. Dean will be deeply missed. BE SOMEBUNNY'S HERO!

Rabbit Hemorrhagic Disease (RHDV) is a highly contagious and deadly virus that affects both pet and wild rabbits. Rabbits who enter our care that haven't already been vaccinated against the disease are vaccinated upon arrival and must be quarantined for 35 days before they're available for adoption. We are currently seeking house rabbit fosters to help us care for bunnies during their quarantine period. *For more information about becoming a foster volunteer, please visit: humanesocietysoco.org/foster/*

Big Love for Little Critters! Guinea pigs, hamsters, rats and mice – oh my! These sweet petites may be tiny, but HSSC is showing them major lifesaving love! So far this year, we have transferred in over 81 small companion animals from overcrowded shelters! And, we've placed 110 wee friends into forever homes this year!

THINGS-A-PAW IN THE Volunteer World

These positions provide critical support to the ACTs and often include opportunities to interact with the animals, such as feeding, mopping and other cleaning in kennels/ habitats. One afternoon a week for six weeks, kids aged 7 to 11 explored different animal-related careers, crafts and games, and enjoyed supervised interactions with animals. The first session sold out in minutes and we're excited to offer more sessions in the near future!

HSSC Summer Camps win PD Best Of award!

LIFESAVING

Twist is part acrobat, part purr machine and 100% kitten! He deftly chases his wand toy, stops to solicit cheek scritches, then commences with his playful leaps and pirouettes. At five months old, he's a "pre-teen" kitten who views the world with confidence and wide-eyed curiosity. And, thanks to your compassion, his world is a whole lot brighter!

Twist was in a vulnerable state and quickly running out of options before coming to HSSC this past September. At his previous shelter, he presented with a condition sometimes known as Orphaned Kitten Prepuce Syndrome. This occurs when orphaned kittens, in absence of a mama, mistakenly nurse on their siblings' genitals. This can lead to scarring and eventually cause damage and obstruction to the urethral opening. This sets the animal up for painful urinary infections and life-threatening blockages but can be remedied with surgery.

Unfortunately, surgery was not an option at Twist's previous shelter. They were overcrowded and faced with making the hardest, most heartbreaking decisions: Twist and several other kittens with medical issues (including eight with ringworm) would be euthanized unless they could find placement elsewhere. Thankfully, we were able to make room and take them all in.

Our veterinary team went for the least invasive route for Twist – a surgery called Preputial Urethrostomy. HSSC DVM Ada Norris describes the procedure as an attempt "to salvage the anatomy and create a functional urinary system." His condition was so severe, however, that he ultimately needed a second, full Perineal Urethrostomy surgery. The surgery was a success. Twist is healing well and will soon be available for adoption. "He's the happiest little kitten and seems grateful for all our interventions," Dr. Ada says.

2022 has been a year marked by urgent pleas and last-minute saves. Our intake team has been inundated with desperate requests from overcrowded regional partners faced with euthanizing animals unless they could find placement elsewhere.

WITH A TWIST



Ringworm

This year, we've taken in a high volume of kittens and cats infected with ringworm who had nowhere else to turn. This highly contagious fungus requires lengthy treatment times and strict isolation protocols – resources that are beyond the means of many of our partner rescues. Sometimes these kittens suffer from severe upper respiratory infections, which need to be treated at the same time. At our highest point this summer, we had four full isolation wards between our Santa Rosa and Healdsburg shelters!

What enables us to expand our capacity to take in the most vulnerable animals? The compassion and coordination of many, including:

Our Beloved Volunteers

Our staff is grateful for our dedicated volunteers who spend several hours a day assisting with dip treatments and socializing of infected cats to help them feel comfortable and loved.

As Saffron Williams, HSSC Feline Behavior Program Manager, explains, "cats who are undergoing treatment for ringworm could, if only given attention during medication, form a negative association with humans. Having consistent visitors who will play with them, sit with them while they eat, and pet and otherwise handle them, ensures that they will have positive experiences with people."

Mary, one of these special volunteers, goes the extra mile and creates disposable toys by hand from recycled materials. While these kitties are living in isolated wards for weeks at a time, Mary and her kicker toys give them much needed enrichment.

Our foster volunteers are another reason we are able to save animals when they need us most. They open their homes to animals recovering from illness or surgery - or baby animals not yet ready for adoption - so that we have space to care for more animals in our shelters. HSSC Foster Program Manager Nicole Gonzales is currently seeking fosters to help with some of our most sensitive groups – bottle baby kittens and those with infectious diseases, like ringworm. "Ringworm fostering requires a dedicated space for the animals that can be easily disinfected," she explains. "A spare bathroom or bedroom with tile flooring works well." Foster parents wear personal protective equipment, and we provide all materials and trainings necessary.

Adorable kitty Ali was transferred to our Healdsburg shelter from the Astro Foundation, a partner shelter in Oakdale, CA. When she arrived she was a little on the shy side, but it didn't take long before this beautiful green eyed girl gained confidence, and got adopted!

Kristen had recently lost her 19 year old cat, and really wanted to find the right companion for her 7 year old kitty Weezie, who was now in need of a playmate. It was Ali's little mustache that caught Kristen's attention, and Ali's description fit what she was looking for in a kitty, so that afternoon she drove to the shelter to meet this little sweetheart. It was love at first sight. Kristen adopted Ali that very day, and recently sent us this update, "I was told she was shy - she hid for the first week at the shelter, but once comfortable, was quite people oriented! As expected, she was shy at home, but if I put my hand under the chair where she hid, she'd rest her cheek against it. If my boyfriend or I laid on the floor, she'd come up on our chests. Within a week she became confident enough to explore the house, eventually not needing to retreat to her hiding spot. We changed her name to 'Purrow' - a play on the mustachioed Agatha Christie character Inspector Poirot.

It took a few weeks for Weezie to accept her, but now they are partners in crime. They love snuggling with us and getting cheek scratches. Purrow sits in my lap every night when I watch TV, and she cuddles with us in bed. She's spunky and full of character! Her meows are laughably expressive and she sits with her paws crossed. I often find an array of cat toys that she has pulled out of the baskets, and I'm happy to see Weezie join in on playtime. I can't wait to see how Purrow reacts to her first 10 foot Christmas tree with us! My boyfriend often comments that I chose the perfect cat."

DOT DOT, NOW MR. DOT DOT

Dot Dot is one lucky rabbit. This sweet guy got a new chance at a forever home when he was surrendered to our care. He was a little bit shy at the shelter, but he was friendly and very cute. When Megan, his adopter, came to HSSC to meet him, it was a done deal. Dot Dot's adorable face won her over, and he was off to new adventures!

We were so happy to hear from Megan with this update: "Mr. Dot Dot is loving his new place. He's so playful, loving, and curious. When we first met Mr. Dot Dot, he was pretty shy and did not like being picked up. But once you picked him up, he loved to sit on your lap for some pets. Since we've brought him home, he has really broken out of his shell. He's a master at flopping. Loves to run and jump around. Also will lick your face to say hello. Mr.Dot Dot is one of the sweetest rabbits. Everyone who's ever met him has fallen in love with him. We want to say thank you to the people of The Humane Society of Sonoma County for allowing us to adopt Mr. Dot Dot. We are so happy Mr. Dot Dot is a part of our family."

After trying for years with a few different homes that just weren't the right fit, Remi once again found herself at HSSC waiting for the right adopters to come along. The last time Remi was returned to our care, we were surprised to find out that Carolyn, one of HSSC's volunteer dog walkers, had her eye on Remi and had been interested in adopting for quite some time! Carolyn and her partner had sadly lost both of their dogs four years ago, but hadn't been ready to adopt yet. He was a little shy at the beginning, but quickly became a staff and volunteer favorite for his sweet, silly personality!

We recently heard from Nicholas with an update: "Ever since Ron Weasley entered our home he's gone from sedated and anxious to excited, content, and cuddly. We all watched Harry Potter the week we got him and realized the name Ron Weasley no longer suited him, he was more like the Phoenix rising from the ashes, so that's why we named him Phoenix. He fits right in with us and we all couldn't be happier."

HSSC's Academy of Dog team believes that the path to positive interactions is paved with gradual introductions to new situations, people and dogs. That's why we offer a series of fun, science-based and stress-free classes designed to support safe and healthy socialization for your puppy – and provide the tools you need to help your pup grow into a happy, confident dog.

The path to pawsitivity begins here!

ORIENTATION: A 60-minute online orientation introducing you to common issues of puppy development, such as housetraining, teething, chewing, equipment and much more, preparing you for classwork ahead!

DROP-OFF PUPPY PLAY: This special 4-week class provides a comfortable, carefully monitored space for your pup to progress at his or her own pace. When your puppy is ready, they will begin to make friends with other classmates, building their own "canine cohort" where they learn to play and interact with ease and confidence. Drop off your puppy for supervised play with other dogs while you run an errand or get a cup of coffee. Come back forty-five minutes later to pick up your happy, tuckered out pup!

KINDERPUPPY: This 4-week class provides a safe and fun learning environment for you and your puppy. Your pup will develop important socialization skills with other pups and their humans. Through games and easy exercises, you will develop basic skills such as sit, come, go-to-mat, and beginning leash walking.

HSSC SHELTER INITIATIVES: TAKING IT TO THE NEXT LEVEL!

As a friend of HSSC and the animals, you're already aware of the many resources we provide for pets and their people. Our donor-supported Community Veterinary Clinic, Pet Food Pantry and Low-Cost Spay/Neuter services are just a few that may come to mind. Now, we are taking it to the next level!

The aim of our new Shelter Initiatives program is to improve, grow and create public programs that will enable HSSC to be even more of a resource center and community staple for all pet lovers in the North Bay and beyond. HSSC's Director of Shelter Initiatives, Meagan Cirivello, has been working hard to assess the needs of pet parents in our community. "The most pressing ones pertaining to pets are often the most basic: food, shelter and veterinary services. And access to these basic services can be limited," she says.

One of our first priorities has been to expand access to our pet pantry. "HSSC's Pet Food Pantry has existed for many years as a place to come and pick up food for their pets," Meagan states, "but what if you don't have a vehicle or can't get to the shelter during business hours?" Her team has been coordinating with local agencies to meet community need where it exists. "We've been going to mobile shower sites for unhoused individuals, bringing pet food and supplies each week. It's been a great way to reach pet guardians who may not be able to get to our shelter. We're also collaborating with our friends at Compassion Without Borders to bring a mobile pet food pantry to their mobile wellness clinic."

Meagan is also developing a "tool kit" to connect historically underserved pet guardians with resources for their pet's basic needs. "We are hoping to provide support to people who experience homelessness, domestic violence, low or fixed income and seniors – all with the mission of helping people and pets."

Stayed tuned! We are assessing and evolving additional public service initiatives, such as pop-up veterinary clinics, animal assisted therapy opportunities, mobile adoptions and much more – and we are truly excited about the possibilities. Bringing – and keeping! – people and their pets together is not only good for the animals, it's good for us humans too. By supporting the human/animal bond, we're supporting the collective health and wellbeing of our beloved community.

Growing and sustaining our safety net programs require the compassion of many.
