Adoptions

Geranium, now a fun-loving kitten, had a bumpy start in life. He came to us from one of our rescue partners in the Central Valley along with four of his siblings. A couple of days after their arrival, many of the kittens broke with lesions on their tongues and noses – signs of a contagious viral infection. Our shelter medical team started treating them right away. As the kittens recovered, they were spayed and neutered, and began finding homes. Geranium developed some tummy troubles and wasn't quite healthy enough to move forward with adoption just yet. Additionally, once his littermates were adopted, he lost his appetite. We knew he needed a little extra TLC, and one of our superhero vet techs, Allie, made it her personal mission to provide that for him!

Here's Allie's account of being sweet Geranium's after-hours caretaker: "Geranium came home with me, where he became BESTIES with my three kitties (who DO NOT

like new cats). We learned that his favorite toys were wand toys and that he LOVES having feline friends. He also grew in confidence and size. His appetite improved amazingly with the encouragement of both me... and my cats! As we became more comfortable, he became more active and playful! Due to his crazy fast zoomies, he earned the name Ricky Bobby from my partner, Adam. We even had him join us in watching 'Talladega Nights' so that he could see where he got his name. We all loved having him! On the very first day after being cleared medically, he was adopted. He was supposed to remain in foster with me but join me at work on workdays, but it didn't happen! Within an hour he met his new fam who are MAJOR NASCAR fans. The father of the family showed up wearing a NASCAR t-shirt. Turns out, they watch NASCAR weekly, had a kitten friend at home (also adopted from us) waiting to meet "Ricky", and they want to keep the name! They also wanted to hear all about his time spent with my little family of five. He went to the best family I could have imagined for him! We are so grateful to have seen him grow and find his forever home!"





At just over 5-years-old and just over 5 pounds, Burger Bob is a tiny little guy who had big anxiety. He was one of several extremely shy little dogs transferred to us when our friends at Inland Valley Humane Society became desperately over capacity.

He needed some veterinary care, including a dental procedure, and who better to foster with than our very own Chihuahua-whisperers, Dr. Ada and RVT Melina!

One by one, this special group of shy dogs began to find forever homes. And, after some time to heal and decompress, Burger Bob was also ready to find a place of his own where he could be accepted and adored on his own unique terms. Dr. Ada shared this heartwarming update from Bob's adopter:

"Now going by the name Gansito, mom reports that he 'has been doing wonderfully and much better than I thought he would be and is starting to be a goofball! He follows his new brother Mixtli around and is living the Chihuahua dream."

Meet Penne, a long noodle of a pup who recently faced a big challenge.

Penne's journey began when his family noticed he wasn't eating and had been vomiting. A trip to the vet revealed something suspicious on a lateral x-ray. Penne was referred to VCA Animal Care Center for further testing, where additional x-rays showed an abnormal mass in his stomach—a foreign object that just wouldn't pass.

Penne's family faced heartbreak and stress due to financial constraints for the surgery. But that's when our friends at VCA Animal Hospitals reached out to us for help! On December 10th, we welcomed this sweet 4-year-old pup with open arms to our Community Vet Clinic and set to work.

Our incredible medical team performed exploratory surgery and discovered a large, bristly fabric mass lodged in Penne's stomach. Thankfully, the rest of his GI tract was clear, and the surgery was a success! Today, Penne is back to his adorable, tail-wagging self—ready to enjoy a lifetime of pet-approved meals!

Volunteers

At HSSC's Healdsburg campus, we are incredibly fortunate to have dedicated, long-time volunteers. One standout is Dan Mason, who has been volunteering with us for over eight years. Throughout that time, Dan has played a vital role in caring for our guinea pigs and many other species.

While most volunteers come in weekly, Dan goes above and beyond—he's at the shelter every single day at 9 a.m. Not only does he clean and care for our guinea pigs, but he also spends time socializing them. Most mornings, you'll find him in a cozy chair, cuddling, offering treats, and even reading to these furry friends.

In the past year alone, our Healdsburg campus has found loving homes for 27 guinea pigs across Sonoma County. With about six guinea pigs on site at any given time, we actively collaborate with rescue partners to transfer in guinea pigs when adoptions occur, helping ease the burden on other shelters.

Dan's unwavering dedication and compassion make all the difference. Thanks to his consistent care, our guinea pigs receive the love and attention they need while they wait for their forever homes.





Like her namesake from the movie Brave, this tiny tabby princess showed incredible courage to defy her fate. Found in a Safeway parking lot at just a few weeks old, this fierce little princess had already endured more than most. She'd suffered a traumatic injury, leaving part of her left front leg exposed and her ear bruised.

Despite her pain, Merida purred nervously, placing her trust in us. Our veterinary team quickly got to work, cleaning her wound and managing her pain. Dr. Kat Menard, DVM, shared, "it's impossible to say what happened to Merida. It could have been an animal or she could have been hit by a car, or something sharp and heavy might have fallen on her."

Merida went to foster after surgery to give her a place where she could recuperate and be spoiled as she recovered. Her amazing foster said "it's clear she is a very special kitten. She is affectionate, sweet, and cuddly. Despite everything she's been through, she is so trusting and eager to share her love with everyone. She leans in for scritches right away and starts purring up a storm. She's very curious about my dog Bear and it's been so fun to watch her try to figure him out!"

After just 15 days in our care, Merida's bravery and charm found her forever family! A huge thank you to all our foster families helping shelter animals heal on the journey to Happily Ever After!


